




In order to provide the high-quality program choices that we strive for, teachers and paraprofessionals across the district and community are consistently engaged in learning communities to increase their depth of knowledge.

0	Watch your child's response. Did adults acknowledge your child or just focus on other adults?	
0	Observe how teachers interact with children. Are they at children's eye level when they talk to them? Do they appear responsive to individual	
	children by listening closely, asking questions and using positive language?	
0	It is important that your child's classroom has a variety of age-appropriate learning materials, toys and equipment.	
0	Are there places for quiet time and an area for dramatic play?	
0	Does the classroom seem clean and safe with enough	
	adults to supervise children?

0	What is the school's philosophy about how children learn?	***************************************
0	What is the school's approach to children's behavior and discipline?	
0	How do activities promote social emotional and intellectual growth and stimulate creativity?

0	Walk around the room and ask the teacher what the child is learning from the different activity centers.	
0	Since no two children are at the same stage of development, how does the teacher support individual children in their learning?	
0	Do children have their own place to keep their special things?	***************************************
0	What is the daily schedule? Does the preschool offer activities your child would like to participate in and is there time for your child to explore?	
0	How does the school communicate with families and how often?	
0	Can you visit the classroom at any time?




Dear Parents and Families,

Have fun using these daily supports for your child's learning!






Estimados padres y familias:

WORKING & PLAYING WITH OTHERS

In kindergarten, children are expected to follow directions, solve problems, and learn through their interactions with others. To be successful they are learning how to:



- Understand their own feelings
- Understand the feelings of others
- Be able to express their emotions effectively
- Calm themselves
- Build relationships
- Communicate in groups

TRABAJAR Y JUGAR CON LOS DEMÁS

En kindergarten, la expectativa es que los niños sigan instrucciones, resuelvan problemas y aprendan mediante sus interacciones con los demás. Para ser exitosos, aprenderán a:



- Comprender sus propios sentimientos
- Comprender los sentimientos de los demás
- Expresar sus emociones eficazmente
- Calmarse
- Forjar relaciones
- Comunicarse en grupo

WORKING & PLAYING WITH OTHERS

To support your child:

Be aware of your own emotions. Demonstrate what you do to stay calm when situations are stressful (take a deep breath, take a walk, etc).

Use clear simple positive language to communicate acceptable behaviors.

Talk about their feelings and make sure they are used to naming how they are feeling.





Set and explain clear expectations that your child can understand, like bedtime or other household rules. Use gestures or visuals while explaining rules or limits.

Allow time to let your child practice taking care of themselves (going to the bathroom, putting on their shoes, etc).

Provide only as much help as is necessary for your child to complete tasks on their own.

TRABAJAR Y JUGAR CON LOS DEMÁS

Para apoyar a sus hijos:

Sé consciente de tus propias emociones.
Demuestre lo que hace para mantener la calma cuando las situaciones son estresantes (tome una respiración profunda, dé un paseo, etc.).

Use un lenguaje simple y positivo para comunicar conductas permitidas.

Hable sobre su sentimientos y asegúrese de que su hijo(a) se acostumbre a expresar cómo se siente.





Establezca expectativas claras y explíquelas de tal manera que su hijo pueda entenderlas, como la hora de irse a dormir u otras reglas del hogar. Usen gestos o recursos visuales para explicar las reglas y límites.

Permita tiempo para que su hijo practique cuidarse a sí mismo (ir al baño, ponerse los zapatos, etc.). Ofrezca su ayuda solo cuando sea necesario para que su hijo(a) haga la tarea asignada por sí mismo.

WORKING AND PLAYING WITH OTHERS

I Can...

Talk about my own and other people's feelings



Read stories to your child. Talk with your child about why the characters look, feel and act the way they do. When your child is angry, sad or happy, name the feeling and talk about it. "I can see you are angry when you stomp your feet."

Calm myself & express my feelings



Help your child express their feelings. The more you recognize and name their emotions the better your child becomes at interpreting their own emotions. Teach your child to deal with frustrations and anger. Show your child how to take three to five deep breaths to calm their strong emotions.

Build relationships with other children alone and in groups



Find opportunities for your child to play with other children their age. Set up play dates at the park, pool or school playground. Go to story time at the library.

Play games that involve taking turns and sharing like simple card and board games or follow the leader.

Solve problems



Read stories and point out when the characters have a problem. "Uh oh! It looks like Dora has a problem! What do you think she'll do to solve it?" Notice times when your child has a problem. "We only have one apple and you and your brother both want it. That looks like a problem. What can we do to solve it?"

Understand there are different rules for different places



Explain that expectations and rules are different depending on where you are. It is okay to run in the park, but you can't run in a store because you might run into someone.

When your child finishes an activity, expect them to help clean up before they start something new.

TRABAJAR Y JUGAR CON LOS DEMÁS

Puedo...

Hablar sobre mis sentimientos y los de los demás



Lean cuentos a sus hijos. Hablen con sus hijos sobre la apariencia física de los personajes y sobre por qué se sienten y actúan de cierta manera. Cuando sus hijos estén enojados, tristes o felices, díganles el nombre de dicho sentimiento y hablen al respecto. "Veo que estás enojado porque das pisotones".

Calmarme y expresar lo que siento



Ayuden a sus hijos a expresar lo que sienten. Mientras más reconozcan y den nombre a sus emociones, mejores serán sus hijos para interpretar sus propias emociones. Enseñen a sus propios hijos a lidiar con las frustraciones y la ira. Enseñen a sus hijos a respirar profundamente de tres a cinco veces para calmar las emociones intensas.

Forjar relaciones con otros niños individualmente y en grupo



Identifique oportunidades para que sus hijos jueguen con otros niños de su edad. Programe sesiones de juegos en el parque, la piscina o el patio de recreo de la escuela. Asista a las horas de cuentacuentos de la biblioteca. Juegue juegos que impliquen esperar turnos y compartir, tales como juegos simples de cartas, juegos de mesa o de seguir al líder.

Resolver problemas



Lean cuentos juntos e indiquen cuando los personajes tengan algún problema. "¡Oh no! ¡Parece que Dora tiene un problema! ¿Qué crees que hará para resolverlo?". Estén pendientes de las ocasiones en que sus hijos tengan algún problema. "Solo tenemos una manzana y tu hermano y tú la quieren". Eso parece ser un problema. ¿Cómo podemos resolverlo?".

Entender que cada lugar tiene reglas diferentes



Explique que las expectativas y reglas varían según el lugar en donde se esté; que está bien correr en el parque pero que no se debe correr en la tienda porque podría tropezarse con alguien.

Enseñen a sus hijos que, cuando terminen una actividad, la expectativa es que ayuden a recoger antes de que empiecen otra.

COMMUNICATING WITH OTHERS

Strong language skills help children enjoy learning to read and write. Through conversations, listening to stories read aloud, and engaging in conversations, children learn new words and develop new concepts. Children use language to:



- Express feelings
- Make requests
- Discuss plans
- Gain information
- Understand new ideas
- Solve problems
- Share ideas and stories

COMUNICACIÓN CON LOS DEMÁS

Las destrezas lingüísticas sólidas ayudan a que los niños disfruten de aprender a leer y escribir. Los niños aprenden palabras y conceptos nuevos cuando participan en conversaciones, y les leen cuentos en voz alta. Los niños utilizan el lenguaje para:



- Expresar lo que sienten
- Pedir algo
- Conversar sobre sus planes
- Obtener información
- Entender ideas nuevas
- Resolver problemas
- Compartir ideas e historias

COMMUNICATING WITH OTHERS

To support your child:

Talk often with your child using a wide range of words to describe objects, events and people. Throughout the day use language to describe what you are doing. Help your child pay better attention to what you are saying by being close to them, at their level, and speaking directly to them.





Be clear and specific when you make requests and give directions. Use gestures and objects to make what you are saying more clear.

Play with your child to help them use and respond to language as they explain, describe and negotiate. Make sure your child is using words to express their needs and wants. Help your child have conversations by giving your child time to understand and respond to what they hear. Ask open-ended questions to encourage responses. ("What would happen if...", "Why do you think so?", "How else could you...?").

COMUNICACIÓN CON LOS DEMÁS

Para apoyar a sus hijos:

Hablen con sus hijos a menudo y utilicen una amplia gama de palabras al describir objetos, situaciones y personas. Describan verbalmente lo que hacen a lo largo del día.

Contribuyan a que sus hijos presten más atención a lo que les dicen al hablarles de cerca, a su nivel y directamente.





Sean claros y
específicos al pedirles
algo y al darles
instrucciones. Usen
gestos y objetos para
hacer que lo que dicen
sea más claro.

Jueguen con sus hijos para fomentar el uso del lenguaje y de respuestas que expliquen, describan y negocien. Asegúrense de que sus hijos expresen lo que desean y necesitan verbalmente. Ayuden a sus hijos a conversar y denles tiempo para comprender y responder lo que se les pregunta. Hagan preguntas de desarrollo que fomenten respuestas. ("¿Qué pasaría si...?, ¿Por qué piensas eso?, ¿De qué otra manera podrías...?").

COMMUNICATING WITH OTHERS

I Can...

Listen to books and talk about the stories



Provide opportunities for your child to listen to stories read aloud.

Go to story time at your library. Call "Phone-a-Story" to listen to stories songs and rhymes in English & Spanish 720-865-8500.

Play with words and sing together



Read nursery rhymes. Change the first letter of a word to make up silly words. Play a rhyming game: "Let's think about all the words that sound like cat."

Listen to music together. Sing with the radio, sing songs from your own childhood, and make up songs together.

Create plans



With your child, make lists of things you need to do. Together: create meal menus; write grocery lists; help your child list what they will need to get done to be ready for school each day.

Sort items into categories



Ask your child to help you: sort the laundry by color, size, type; sort the silverware by type; sort their toys; sort the groceries.

Use words to talk about my ideas and needs



Ask your child to tell you about their ideas and needs in words, rather than gestures. It may take time for your child to find the words. Wait for them, give them time to process, find their words, and respond. Use open ended questions to help get your child started. Try asking questions like "What do you think about ... ?", "Why do you think...", "How can we...?" "Then what happened after ... ?" "That's very interesting, tell me more.".

COMUNICACIÓN CON LOS DEMÁS Puedo...

Escuchar cuentos y hablar sobre ellos



Provean oportunidades para que sus hijos escuchen lecturas de cuentos.

Asistan a las horas de cuentacuentos de la biblioteca. Llamen a "Phone-a-Story" al 720-865-8500 para escuchar cuentos, canciones y poemas en inglés y en español.

Hacer juegos de palabras y cantar con otras personas



Lean poemas infantiles. Cambien la primera letra de una palabra para formar palabras locas. Jueguen a rimar: "Pensemos en todas las palabras que suenan como gato".

Escuchen música juntos. Canten las canciones de la radio y de su niñez, e inventen canciones juntos.

Hacer planes



Con sus hijos, hagan listas de las cosas que hay que hacer. Creen menús de comidas, hagan listas de los comestibles que hay que comprar y ayuden a sus hijos para que enumeren las cosas que deben hacer a fin de prepararse diariamente para la escuela.

Clasificar objetos según distintas categorías



Pídanles a sus hijos que los ayuden a clasificar la ropa que van a lavar según el color, a clasificar los cubiertos según el tipo y a clasificar sus juguetes y los comestibles.

Expresar oralmente mis ideas y necesidades



Pidan a sus hijos que les hablen sobre sus ideas y necesidades, en lugar de comunicarlas mediante gestos. Puede que les tome tiempo identificar las palabras que necesitan para comunicarse. Esperen a que lo hagan, denles tiempo para procesar lo que se les pide e identificar las palabras necesarias, y responder. Háganles preguntas de desarrollo para ayudarles a comenzar. Háganles preguntas como "¿Qué opinas de...?", "¿Por qué piensas eso?", "¿Cómo podemos hacer...?", "¿Y qué pasó después de...?", "Eso suena muy interesante, cuéntame más".

LEARNING WITH OTHERS

When children have a positive approach to learning they are likely to want to learn more. Play is important for learning. There are many connections between brain development, play and learning. Pretend play supports the development of imagination, school adjustment, memory, language and self-regulation. When they represent objects, events, or people who are not present, children are thinking at a higher level. Children learn to:



- Plan and pursue interesting tasks
- Stay engaged while ignoring most distractions
- Feel eager to learn and be curious about many things
- Change plans if a better idea is thought of or suggested

APRENDIZAJE CON LOS DEMÁS

Cuando los niños experimentan el aprendizaje de manera positiva, es probable que quieran aprender más. El juego es importante para el aprendizaje. Existen muchas conexiones entre el desarrollo cerebral, el juego y el aprendizaje. Los juegos de fantasía fomentan el desarrollo de la imaginación, la adaptación a la escuela, la memoria, el lenguaje y la autorregulación. Cuando juegan a representar objetos, situaciones o gente que en realidad no están presentes, los niños utilizan destrezas de razonamiento elevado. Los niños aprenden a:



- Planificar y llevar a cabo tareas interesantes
- Concentrarse e ignoran la mayoría de las distracciones
- Desear aprender y se preguntan muchas cosas
- Cambiar de planes si se les ocurre o se les sugiere una mejor idea

LEARNING WITH OTHERS

To support your child:

Provide specific positive feedback or support to find solutions. Let them keep turning a puzzle piece until it fits saying, "Keep turning the piece", "Look at the shape, does it match the empty space?", "Does it go with the picture?".

Give positive feedback for your child's effort not the end result.





Help your child see their mistakes as opportunities for learning. Describe the strategies your child uses when solving a problem. "You're a problem solver. You didn't give up! You tried reaching into the jar to get the balls out, and then you turned the jar over and dumped them out."

Encourage your child in problem solving by offering encouragement, support, and new ideas if needed.

APRENDIZAJE CON LOS DEMÁS

Para apoyar a sus hijos:

Provean comentarios o apoyos positivos y específicos para identificar soluciones. Mientras sus hijos traten de colocar una pieza de rompecabezas en el lugar correcto, díganles: "Observa la forma, ¿tiene la misma forma que el espacio en donde la quieres colocar?", "¿Se ve como la imagen del lugar en donde la quieres colocar?".

Provean comentarios positivos a sus hijos por el esfuerzo que hagan y no por el resultado final.





Ayuden a que sus hijos perciban sus errores como oportunidades de aprendizaje. Describan las estrategias que sus hijos aplican cuando resuelven problemas. "Resolviste tus problemas. ¡No te rendiste! Primero, trataste de sacar las pelotas metiendo la mano en el frasco, pero después volteaste el frasco y salieron todas".

Fomenten las destrezas de resolución de problemas de sus hijos al animarlos, apoyarlos y ofrecer ideas nuevas, si corresponde.

LEARNING WITH OTHERS

I Can...

Plan and persist on tasks



Give your child simple chores or house projects to complete on their own. If a task seems overwhelming, help your child break it down into smaller parts, don't just solve it for them. For example: feeding a pet, setting the table, getting ready for bed by themselves, etc.

Stay on task and ignore most distractions



Support your child in working on a project from beginning to end (this can take a long time). On average, young children can stick with an activity for about 10 minutes. Help your child break-up tasks into a series of shorter chunks and follow through to the end.

Be curious about many things and eager to learn



Respond to your child's explorations and discoveries with enthusiasm and encouragement rather than providing rewards like stickers or prizes. When your child is curious, encourage them to ask questions and support them in finding answers.

Change plans if a better idea is thought of or proposed



Encourage your child to think of different ways to create something using a variety of materials. For example, let them see how many ways they can make a boat using milk cartons, paper tubes, foil etc.

Make mistakes and learn different ways to do things



Allow your child to make harmless mistakes and learn from them. Young children often want their own way. For example, if they don't want to wear their mittens, allow them to experience the cold weather and then decide whether to put on the mittens.

APRENDIZAJE CON LOS DEMÁS Puedo...

Planificar tareas y ser persistente para llevarlas a cabo



Asignen tareas o proyectos del hogar simples a sus hijos para que los hagan por sí solos. Si alguna tarea parece abrumadora, ayuden a sus hijos a dividirla en partes más pequeñas, pero no las resuelvan ustedes. Por ejemplo, alimentar a la mascota, servir la mesa, prepararse por sí solos para irse a dormir, etc.

Concentrarme en mi trabajo e ignorar la mayoría de las distracciones



Apoyen a sus hijos de principio a fin cuando trabajen en algún proyecto (esto puede tomar bastante tiempo). En promedio, los niños pequeños se concentran en una actividad por 10 minutos. Ayuden a sus hijos a dividir las tareas en una serie de pasos más cortos, y a cumplirlos hasta el final..

Tener curiosidad sobre muchas cosas y estar ansioso de aprender



Muestren entusiasmo por las exploraciones y descubrimientos de sus hijos y aliéntenlos, en vez de darles recompensas como calcomanías o premios. Cuando sus hijos sientan curiosidad, fomenten sus preguntas y apóyenlos para que den con las respuestas.

Cambiar de planes si se me ocurre o se me sugiere una mejor idea



Animen a sus hijos para que piensen en las distintas maneras en que pueden crear algo con una variedad de materiales. Por ejemplo, díganles que piensen en cuántas maneras hay de hacer un barco con cartones de leche, tubos de cartón, papel aluminio, etc.

Cometer errores y aprender distintas maneras de hacer las cosas



Dejen que sus hijos comentan errores leves y que aprendan de ellos. A menudo, los niños pequeños quieren hacer las cosas a su manera. Por ejemplo, si no quieren usar sus guantes de invierno, dejen que sientan el frío y que tomen la decisión de ponerse los guantes.
